


Challenges

Child Poverty Rates By Colorado County








Race and Ethnicity Percentages by BOCES





Sample Regional Problem and Goal Statement: San Luis Valley

San Luis Valley (SLV) Region

During the 21-22 school year a total of 184 disciplinary actions occurred regionally across schools, male students of color with a disability had 147 disciplinary actions (for 70 students) and white students had 28 (for 22 students) because administration, teachers and paraprofessionals need training in cultural proficiency, generational trauma, and learner variability.

Problem Statement

Goal Statement

By May 2026, the SLV region will implementing COMTSS across the region and secure high-quality PD to decrease disciplinary removal of male students of color with disabilities by 20% per year. Additionally, implementing an effective and equitable Response to Intervention process within COMTSS across the region to decrease initial evaluations for special education by 25% per year.

Regional Capacity Assessment

The Regional Capacity
Assessment (RCA) assesses
the effectiveness of regional
implementation of COMTSS to
assist in their efforts to
effectively support districts.

The RCA is administered two times each year and is used to monitor progress. After each RCA administration the team reviews previous scores and adjusts the Regional Capacity Implementation Plan as necessary.

Regional Capacity Assessment Goals and Achievements

Achieve an increase of 20% percentage points each year or to reach 80% total score by 2026.

Two regions that joined in 2022 met the annual increase target.


San Luis Valley region increased from 9% in 2022 to 32% in 2023 reaching 20% growth.

San Juan region increased from 41% in 2022 to 55% in 2023.

Santa Fe Trail region joined this year and scored of 34% as their baseline.

Practice




Regional Capacity Assessment 2023
