UCONN Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities and Connecticut Office of Early Childhood

Purpose: Build state and community capacity to develop, demonstrate, evaluate, and replicate an interagency system to track, identify, screen, refer or monitor infants and toddlers at risk for, or having a delay or disability in CT.

1st Demonstration Site: Hartford



Model Elements

- Implement Integrated data system across state systems for tracking and screening children from birth, or system entry
- Use Ages and Stages Questionnaire to identify and monitor children's development using a mobile app called Sparkler (and other options for families)
- Parent to Parent outreach to increase parent/caregiver participation in the tracking, identification, screening, referral or monitoring, and evaluation of services for their child



Implementation Phases

Phase One • To collect data on current systems for **Exploration** tracking young children (year 1) • To plan a demonstration with Phase Two state and local stakeholders (Year Installation 1) Phase Three • To implement a local demonstration (Year 2) **Implementation** • To validate and adapt **Phase Four** demonstration practices To Standardization other sites (Year 3-4) • To adopt and implement tracking, Phase Five identification, Institutionalization screening, and referral/monitor

- DPH also has MOU with OEC to share list of newborns that have failed newborn screenings
- Infants automatic eligibilty also go through Health care Provider or Families


- Led by SRI International in Collaboration with FPG Child Development Institute

 - Promote equity in access to Part C services






Information Gathering to Inform Planning

- Community Leadership Teams meet monthly
- Exploration phase includes:
 - Local Child Find Self-Assessment
 - Data relevant to child find from state data system
- Planning will include
 - Selecting/adapting evidencebased practices
 - Developing action plan

PROJECT GOALS

- Develop a replicable model for cross-sector collaboration and capacity-building
- Obtain parents/caregivers perspectives around culturally responsive materials and resources
- Use valid and reliable culturally responsive screening practices and tools by LCFT partner programs and an SRC of providers

Increase referrals to IDEA Part C services, or partner agencies for non-Part C services, for infants and toddlers that represent underserved, hard-to-reach or otherwise underreferred populations or demographics

Engaging Families in Rural Communities: Who & How

- What does your data tell you about who is served (and who isn't)?
- What would you like to know about identification and referral activities?
- How do you think we can best engage families that are hard-toreach?



Identification and Referral to Early Intervention

- How do you explain Part C/Early Intervention to Parents/Caregivers?
- What information do you use in your decision-making process to refer or not refer?
- What has been your experience with Part C/Early Intervention Services?
- What could Part C do that would be helpful?



Forming a Local Child Find Team (LCFT)

- Who are the Local Part C partners? Why did we identify those partners? What role might they play in this project?
- How do we want to reach out to the partners, and by when?
- How do we start engaging partners in conversations, and who will lead that effort?
- What changes do we hope to see? What changes do partners hope to see?
- How will partners benefit from this project?



Approaches to Gathering Data

- Physician, Child Care and Family Surveys
- Parent/Caregiver Focus Groups
- Early Childhood Partners Structured Conversations
- Parent/Caregiver Interviews
- Analyzing existing referral, family outcome and eligibility data
